From the Pastor

"But when ye pray, use not **vain repetitions** (βατταλογήσητε), as the heathen do: for they think that they shall be heard for their much speaking" Matthew 6:7 KJV.

The KJV translates βατταλογήσητε as vain repetitions, from 'battos' (stammer) and 'logos' (word) – the thought being that stammerers often repeat the same sounds/words. It is from this translation that some Protestant church bodies get the notion that using written or memorized prayers is forbidden by Christ. What do we say about this?

"Vain," or useless, prayer is the key here. Matthew 6:7 echoes Elijah's showdown with prophets of Baal in 1 Kings 18:26-29. Elijah mocks them because he knows their hours of repeated prayers are useless – there was no one to answer. This was typical of pagan worship in Jesus' time too. The Gentiles believed they had to repeat their prayers over and over for their gods to even hear and answer them at all.

Jesus' point about vain repetitions is that prayer to false gods is *always* vain. But he also has a message for our prayer/worship life too: the words we address to God must come from the heart, and must not simply be "empty phrases" or thoughtless prayer (babbling, as other translations render Matthew 6:7).

Repeated prayer itself is certainly not bad. Scripture is filled with such prayers – many of them recited in the actual presence of God. Consider

- Revelation 4:8: "the four living creatures ... day and night ... never cease to sing, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come!"
- Psalm 136, recited at every Passover and many other solemn occasions, has a repetitive framework integral to the Psalm itself, and also repeats the phrase, "for his steadfast love endures forever," 26 times.
- In Luke 18:3-9, Jesus uses the parable of the persistent widow and unjust judge to teach his disciples that they "ought *always* to pray and not lose heart." This widow "kept coming" to the judge, saying the same thing: "Vindicate me against my adversary" essentially a repeated prayer. Jesus then confirms that God will *quickly* answer those "who cry to him day and night" repeatedly asking for his help.
- In Mark 14:33-39 Jesus himself repeated his own prayers: "remove this chalice from me; yet not what I will, but what you will ... And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words."
- Jesus himself, when instructing the disciples to pray, gives them words to repeat each time when the pray, saying, "When you pray, say, 'Our Father...' (Luke 11:2).

Thus, not only is repetitive prayer permitted and encouraged, it is answered.

Dear brothers and sisters: if you want to pray from your heart without using memorized prayers, that is good and right. If you want to pray using formulaic prayers you have memorized and repeat, that is good and right also. Whichever you use, pray in faith knowing that your heavenly Father hears you and has promised to answer.

And if you still have concerns about using pre-written prayers, consider this: In Deuteronomy 6, the Lord instructs His people to impress His word upon the hearts and minds of their children. An old Latin proverb states that 'repetition is the mother of learning'... so perhaps memorizing prayers and using them repeatedly (with faith) just does have some benefit and merit in the life of a Christian, for it can instruct us in the Word of God and imprint it upon our hearts.

"The Singing Church"

Lutherans have historically been called "the singing church." There is no doubt that music has been a major component in the theology and practice of the Lutheran church. Luther once remarked about music, "We can mention only one point, namely, that next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." I Music has a power and purpose that cannot be understated in our worship and the life of the congregation.

But music does more than touch the emotions. Music is a vehicle that carries both the musician and the hearer deeper into connection with the truth of the Scriptures. This is true of the most complex Bach chorale and even the simplest of songs like "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." Each musical selection within the church shapes the thoughts, minds and faith of the people who experience them.

This is also true of stewardship hymns. We are currently considering the verses of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) as it shapes our understanding and practice of stewardship. This month we take a deeper dive into verse two:

Teach us to thank you, Lord, for love and grace

For life and vision, for a purpose clear,

For Christ Your Son, and for each human face

that shows Your message ever new and near.

The stanza begins by touching on the truth of the Law. Thankfulness is not a natural posture for fallen humanity. For sinners curved in upon themselves, thankfulness for love and grace is something that must be taught. We are those who hoard and clutch. Our confession of our shallow thankfulness highlights the need for us to learn thankfulness to God.

Thankfulness also points to what we are stewards of: love and grace! All the things we have traditionally called stewardship aren't actual stewardship. Rather, what matters is how we steward the one, true and only treasure: the love and grace of God revealed to us in the Gospel of

Jesus Christ. So, all stewardship is stewardship of the Gospel! How can we gaze at the cross and empty tomb and not be thankful?

The LCMS defines stewardship as "the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes." God's love and mercy give us a clear purpose as we live out our Baptism and practice this joyous stewardship. All we are, all we have entrusted to us, and all we are called to do is to connect others with the love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus!

The faithful steward sings with lips and life of this love and mercy that is ever new and near. In the Scriptures. In the Lord's House. At the Lord's Table. This is where our stewardship song starts and ends. Our family, our co-workers and classmates, and our world need to hear this song!
